DISHES WORTH THE DRIVE

It's time again to take a culinary tour through Irvine of dishes that are so good that they're worth a drive in traffic from Los Angeles. This month, we have some delicious dishes to spotlight from a brand new Italian steakhouse and a new Mediterranean restaurant. There may be plenty of Italian and Mediterranean food in Los Angeles, but these specific dishes are so good that we're recommending a trip down south for them.

The first restaurant we're showcasing this month is Davio's Northern Italian Steakhouse at Irvine Towers. Although the Irvine location has only been

open since October 2018, it belongs to an already established family of restaurants with locations in Atlanta and along the East Coast. Their food is inspired from Northern Italian cuisine and includes handmade pasta, seafood and, of course, steak. "It has always been a dream of mine to open a restaurant in California ... and what could possibly be better than being in Irvine? It's very exciting for us to be here. We can't wait to become part of this wonderful community," says Steve DiFillipp, chef and owner of Davio's.

The first dish offered at Davio's that makes the drive from L.A. worthwhile

is the Kobe Meatballs. These are made with American Kobe beef, veal and pork. It actually takes three days to make these, and you can really tell. They're so tender that they melt in your mouth; whether you're a meatball connoisseur or you just really love meat, you have try these meatballs. It's mind-blowing to think that they almost never came to be. "In 1985 we didn't have meatballs on our menu. No way, I said. Meatballs are an American invention; they're not Italian," says DiFillipp. "I didn't want any of it in my upscale restaurant. ... Fast-forward to present day, meatballs are acceptable

in upscale restaurants. ... Finally, I gave in and showed the guys how to make them like my mom did. Working together, we tweaked the recipe, substituting Kobe beef for normal ground beef. Today, we sell more meatballs than you can imagine."

On weekends, you can also splurge on a \$100 meatball, which is made of American Kobe Wagyu beef, black truffles and a molten center of truffle cheese and faux gras. It's then topped with a champagne cream sauce and more shaved black truffles, and served with a glass of Barolo. Or if you're on a budget, Davio's still has you covered.

During happy hour, which is 4 - 7 p.m. Monday-Friday and 5 - 7 p.m. Saturday and Sunday, American Kobe Beef Meatball Sliders are available for \$9 on the Bar Bites menu. No matter if you get the Kobe meatball from the traditional menu, as a \$100 meatball or in a slider, it's a unique dish that's so scrumptious, it's definitely worth the drive from L.A. to Irvine.

If meatballs aren't your thing, or you prefer seafood, the second dish we chose to spotlight is the crab cake. It's one of Davio's signature dishes, consisting of lump crab cake that's oven baked and topped off with a whole grain mustard sauce. The combination of the crab meat with the mustard sauce really makes this dish special and worth the drive from Los Angeles.

Moving from Italy to the Middle East, our second restaurant, SAJJ Mediterranean, just opened its Irvine location last November in the Sand Canyon Plaza shopping center (their first location is in Santa Margarita). So what makes this Mediterranean

restaurant so special? First, everything is customizable. That's why our first dish to spotlight is their Build Your Own Bowl (pitas or salads are also choices for your base). Diners can choose to fill it with chicken or steak shawarma, pomegranate chicken, shawafel (falafel and shawarma) or their signature falafel. After that, unlimited toppings and sauces, including hummus, cilantro mint chutney, tahini, tzatziki and peri peri are available for further customization.

Recently, SAJJ launched "lifestyle" bowls to appeal to various types of diets. "In the last year or so, we've watched as the restaurant industry has begun to adapt and change to meet the specific dietary needs and preferences of consumers, and while our offerings are already highly customizable to fit those needs, we wanted to take that one step further and make it easier for guests to order a bowl that fits their lifestyle," says Zaid Ayoub, Founder and CEO of SAJJ Mediterranean. "Our goal at SAJJ has always been to serve fresh, healthy food

fast, and the introduction of our new Lifestyle Bowls will fulfill every part of that promise!" Lifestyle bowls include a Paleo, Keto and Double Protein bowl. Essentially a make-your-own Mediterranean bowl for anyone's taste or diet, it's truly worth the drive from Los Angeles.

The second dish we want to spotlight is so unique that it can't be found in most Mediterranean restaurants, making it definitely worth the drive to Irvine: chocolate hummus. That's right, you read it right. It's a healthy dessert alternative that is low in fat, sodium and carbohydrates - it's only 240 calories per 6-ounce container. The dish is made with just six ingredients: garbanzo beans, tahini, cocoa powder, chocolate hazelnut spread, maple syrup and vanilla extract. It can be ordered with house-made cinnamon sugar-dusted chips or on its own. There aren't many places in L.A. that offer this unique of a dish, so it's definitely worth the drive to Irvine! All entrees at SAJJ are also served with complimentary lentil soup. Fries, pita chips, hummus, falafel and baklava can be purchased as additional sides.

Traditional Middle Eastern beverages, like mint and strawberry lemonade, tamarind and a mint yogurt drink, are house-made and available to order as well.

Whether you're in the mood for a culinary trip to Italy or to the Middle East, these dishes are so delicious that we recommend our Angelino friends up north come down to Irvine and try them. Stay tuned next month for four new dishes worth the drive from Los Angeles to Irvine!

and I'll hold a competition, and the community (in my particular case, people on Reddit and on Instagram) will vote for what design they want to win. That's the design that's printed and then distributed."

Petr had become a sort of cultural touchstone on campus, from what I could tell off the UCI forums, and I asked both of them about that. Why the anteater, specifically? Was there something inherently funny about it, or something about the UCI student body that would naturally endear them to Petr the Anteater?

"If you look at our meme accounts, et cetera, that's where most of our culture comes from," Cardio Petr pointed out. Original Petr said that it was always his intention for Petr to become such a widespread and well-known symbol of campus culture, and both seemed to agree on that:

"So, back to the origins of Petr." Cardio Petr was prepared to explain from top to bottom how the whole movement started. "It popped up on reddit as a design and the whole pretext was, we want to bring something to UCI culture."

He complimented the student body's event planning, but noted that some students are not as interested in social events, and he feels very positively about helping them experience college in their own way. Petr, compared to events like Shocktoberfest or Freshman Orientation, "is a lot more spontaneous. It pops in and out. Somebody will show up

Original Petr seemed to be in agreement, adding that he wanted to add to the culture in any way he could.

"Sarcastic?" I asked. He clarified. "I mean, [the anteater] is just a funny looking icon. [Petr the Anteater] is a community interpretation of what our mascot really is." The community interpretations haven't just stopped at the anteater himself, as both Petrs pointed out.

"About my Petrs," Original Petr texted.

"I love them all so much, but it's also within my creative mindset, so they don't excite me the way other people's renditions do."

And what was your favorite version? I asked.

"I once got a Peter of me," he responded. "It had my beanie, gloves, and the whole get up. It was holding a Petr sticker as well!" There had been other interpretations, too, more unusual ones -- engineering projects, rave totems, photo mosaics and Cardio Petr's personal favorite: A rendition of the goofy little anteater with a tear running down his face, clutching a midterm bearing a red "C-".

When asked about what's in store for the two most famous, secretive Petr-sticker vendors on campus, both had big answers. Original Petr kept it vague, saying that he has much in store both Petr-wise and "not directly Petr-related." Cardio Petr alluded to a larger citywide version of his notorious online scavenger hunt.

Summertime is upon us! Which means Power 106 is doing it bigger than they've ever done in the past. Living up to their slogan of being "Los Angeles' #1 For Hip Hop" radio station, concert-goers are blessed with an all-star lineup of

both up-and-coming and mainstream artists, including Mustard & Friends, G-Eazy, Tyga, French Montana, Blueface, T-Pain, O.T. Genasis, A-Track, Roddy Ricch and more.

Presented by Mercury Insurance, the one-day festival on Saturday, May

18 is slated to take place at Irvine's most prominent venue – FivePoint Amphitheatre – where some of music's biggest names come to perform.

In addition, Jason brings up a great point that fans can get their money's worth in one day, verses coming back for more. "I'm excited that the show is one day because as much as I love and go to a lot of festivals, I can't give up multiple three-day weekends! I get to see everyone in one day that I want to see."

The announcement for this year's Liftoff was a movie in itself. French Montana and Gashi came up to the station to party and turn up with all the on-air personalities and staff, live streaming from Power 106's Youtube page while sipping on Frenchie's own

Speaking of Gashi, he will be one of the main artists performing on Liftoff's New Music stage.

Bryhana, on air from 10 a.m. - 3 p.m., states, "I prefer festivals because I like

a lot going on. I love that we have two stages. One for up-and-coming artists to give them a platform and a place to perform for people who haven't even seen them before, and also see bigger artists that they probably still haven't

seen. It will be cool to vibe out the whole entire day!"

In fact, President and COO of Meruelo Media Otto Padron makes the analogy of the venue serving as the perfect space for this highly anticipated festival. He states, "The two most exciting things about this year's Powerhouse are ... a focus on new music under "The Liftoff" brand ... and making its launch pad a very cool festival venue in Irvine."

Whether it's Tyga performing "Taste," O.T. Genasis performing "Bae," G-Eazy performing "West Coast" featuring Blueface, and of course Blueface shutting down the stage with "Thotiana" – which will undoubtedly bring out all the ratchets – May 18 will be a big day for hip-hop fans in SoCal.

Eman, interim VP of programming for Power 106, states, "We are very excited to be bringing our 'Liftoff' concert to the O.C.! May 18 will be a great musical experience with some of the newest and hottest artists out! And you know how Power 106 does ... you'll never know who'll show up on stage!"

Tickets are on sale for \$55.50 and can be purchased on LiveNation.com.



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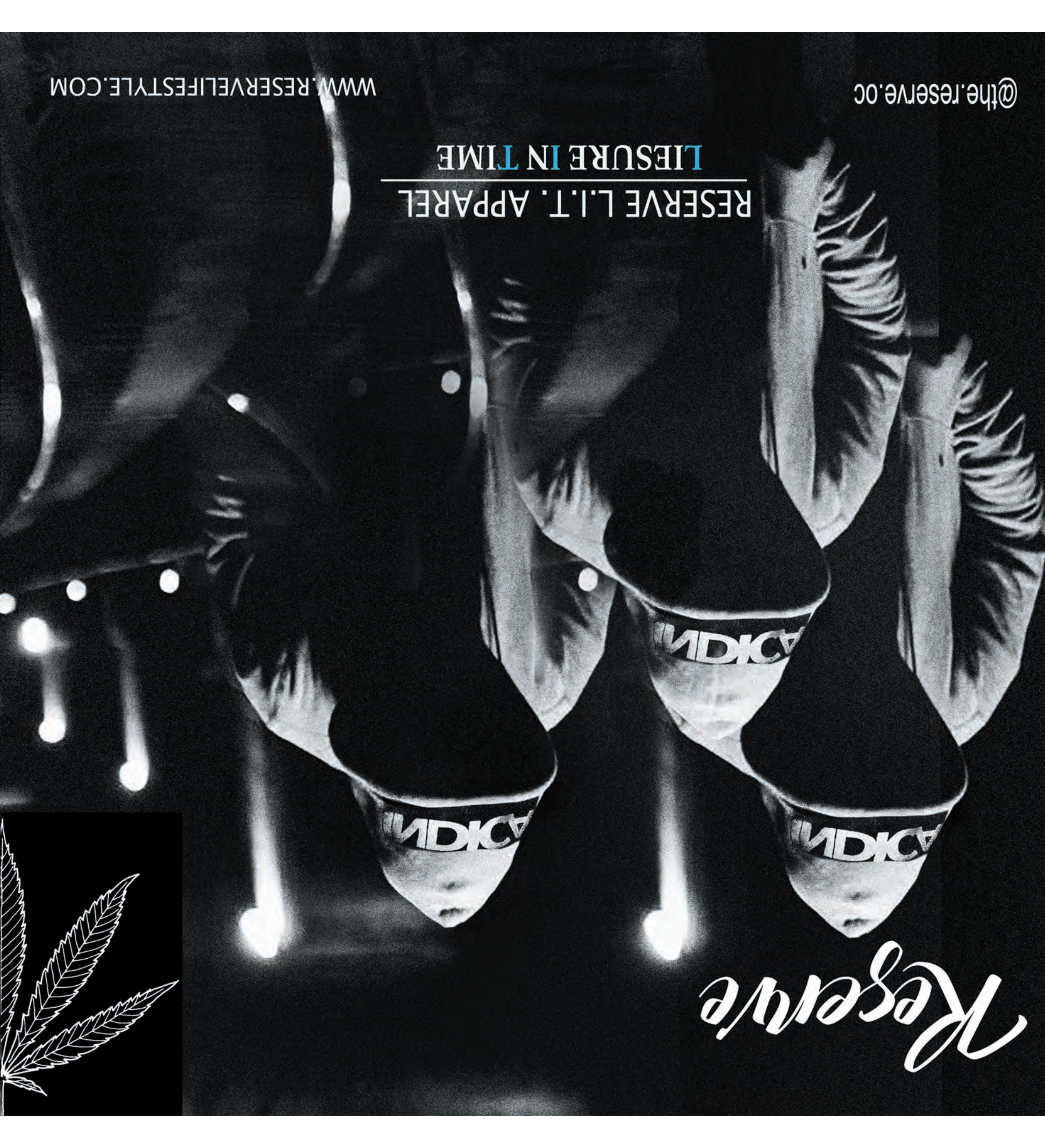


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HOW THE CANNABIS INDUSTRY CAME TO IRVINE

THE FUTURE OF CANNABIS SCIENCE IN THE BIOTECH-FRIENDLY CITY.

Irvine has always been a tough sell on both sides when it came to the cannabis industry. But now, laboratories that fit right in with the science scene of one of SoCal's most cutting-edge communities are starting to pop up.

Despite legalization, the idea of the cannabis industry taking root in Irvine in any capacity seemed like fantasy not long ago. To get our heads around how

it all went down, we reached out to one of Irvine's newest businesses, BioCann Laboratories, who also played a big part in making it happen.

Founder Sulaiman Masood explained his past in the laboratory space prior to getting BioCann off the ground. His other labs are across the clinical spectrum in areas that include toxicology, biochemistry, pathology and pharmacogenomics. BioCann will be

his third time opening a lab.

"We were brought into the industry because we already knew how to operate. The industry wants people who know how to be professional about it," Masood told Irvine Weekly in a phone interview. "People want to make sure their tests are run by clinical laboratory scientists. They're getting an accurate result, and we're looking out for the safety of the public."

Masood's business partner had previously been approached a few years ago about the idea. At the time, they simply weren't sure. Masood's labs provide services to a lot of folks in the world of substance abuse recovery. He feared the possibility of getting involved with cannabis might give his other projects a black eye in the communities they serve.

Eventually, BioCann's consultant Alex

Mohamed would approach Irvine Mayor Donald P. Wagner to query him on the possibilities of opening the lab. Wagner was quick to say they don't allow cannabis. Irvine, of course, has proven a tough egg to crack. The 15th largest city in the state remains one of the largest where residents don't have access to a legal cannabis storefront locally. Mohamed would end up carrying the ball all the way to the endzone in regards to changing local ordinances and was there the day everything was finalized for BioCann, and its competitors.

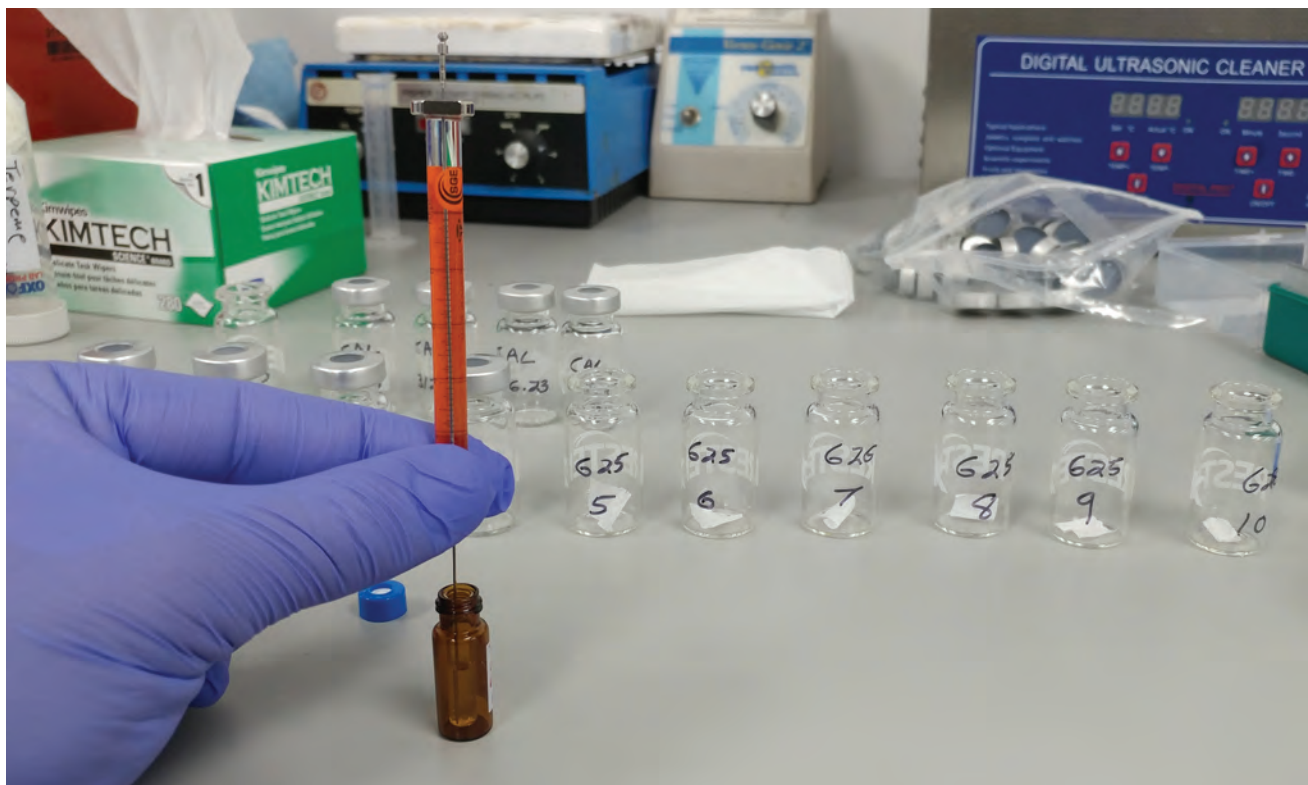
Mohamed had originally made a name for himself as a political consultant. In 2011 he worked to help get former Huntington Beach Assemblyman Travis Allen elected. "We pulled off a win for an Assembly seat that was in an incumbent's area. We had no reason to win this race, and we won it by 16,000 votes," Mohamed said. With no money from Sacramento or endorsements, they had pulled it off, and he was now a name in SoCal Republican circles. His continued push to help the party stay as connected as possible to their Orange County voting block helped him network in Sacramento too.

Those Sacramento folks represented various symbiotic relationships for Mohamed as he worked to represent other labs and also waste management and landscaping companies vying for city contracts. This lab opportunity would arise through one of those contacts he'd made in the hazmat space.

That regulator had found himself at a conference where everyone wondered what exactly they were looking for in making sure cannabis was safe to consume. "Residual solvents? Heavy metals? Heavy metals weren't even a topic of conversation at the time," Mohamed said.

"He called me to pick my brain a little bit and asked if I was interested in the industry. The answer was no," said Mohamed, citing his work in the mental health and recovery sectors at other labs. He considered anything that could be construed as promoting weed to be unethical.

Then he saw the numbers being thrown around in the cannabis industry in general and he knew someone was going to make a decent buck testing all that legal marijuana. Mohamed thought to open another lab in a scientifically prestigious city like Irvine,



"a city that doesn't scream weed, but in fact, is saying no weed." That would make everything way more legitimate in his eyes.

"We approached the city and said we're scientists trying to help this state regulate this industry, not weed guys trying to get their laboratory going. That's exactly what they were looking for. Mayor Wagner had known Mohamed before getting elected, he'd even had bloodwork done at one of the labs he worked with.

"I told him it's the same thing, it's no different from what I'm currently doing. Just change the blood sample for weed. I said we aren't going to have lines, I'm not looking for a green cross outside the door," said Mohamed. He further explained the process and gained the mayor's support. From there, it took about nine months to get the bylaws changed.

Once they got into the building, they were able to complete the state licensing process in about three months. The lab officially opened at the end of March.

We asked the pair for their general take on the state of the vibe around cannabis in Irvine. Where does it go from here?

"Shockingly and very surprisingly, I think we've had some great feedback from South Orange County. These areas I always thought were very



conservative shock me," said Mohamed. Part of the shock on the other side is just the idea there is a regulatory body tracking testing for pesticides he has to comply with.

"I think the consensus is people are becoming a little bit more admissible, I think the guard is down now. If we educate about what cannabis does, and what CBD does, and what CBN does. Everyone knows what THC does," said Mohamed.

No matter the case, Irvine is now a part

of the green rush. But the general aura of scientific progress could prove to be a host for the future of cannabis science. Marco Troiani of Digamma Consulting, the company that helped BioCann establish their methodology, told Irvine Weekly due to the new lax lab permitting in the city, "We've seen a lot of new testing labs trying to get started there, so they are lowering the barrier compared to the San Francisco area."

CELEBRATE WITH THE BEST CANNABIS IRVINE HAS TO OFFER.

The maximization of the 4/20 experience for the Irvine cannabis enthusiast tends to involve a bit of a road trip be it the day of or in prior preparation for the holiday, but we've got a list of some of the best cannabis in California that's locally available and sure to be worth your travels.

Some might fall back on delivery services, and there is nothing wrong with that. The lack of municipal access

in Irvine makes it a necessity for some to access cannabis in the most convenient way possible be it their age, ailments or a busy lifestyle. But others see the holiday more like Thanksgiving, and nobody would ever consider getting their turkey delivered unless it's a giant block of tofu shaped like a turkey.

Regardless, the cannabis available to you this holiday season will be quite exceptional. You can always presume folks will sit on some great nuggets for

customers for the holiday. But even then, they go super fast. This list includes champions from every major cannabis competition on the west coast: High Times, The Emerald Cup, and a whole bunch of other events where this group of cultivators has cleaned out the trophy case. These kind of accolades aren't just handed out to the highest bidder, despite those who will never have a chance to walk across their stages during awards ceremonies claiming

otherwise.

So in reality, while these strains will likely have a batch available on the actual holiday, it's not going to last long ... any of them. Your best bet is to try and pick some up early. If they try and tell you, "We can't sell that until tomorrow," just think about when Bambi's mom got taken out, get the waterworks going, maybe a light sniffle or two. If that doesn't get you access to the goods, they're heartless.

Here is our list of this year's essential 4/20 strains near Irvine.

Sunset Fig - Fig Farms - Med Men

The newest offering from the amazing farmers at Fig Farms has hit shelves just in time for the holiday. Known for their unique genetics going back to the medical market, this time they've paired their prize Purple Fig with the San Francisco classic Sunset Sherbert. With the past results of their in-house breeding effort ending up in awards ceremonies up and down the state, it's a safe bet the Sunset Fig will follow that path too. But which phenotype will reign supreme in the end? Fig Farms debuted two versions of the Sunset Fig for the holiday, one pheno tastes like gassy grapes and lavender, the other is more of golden raisins with a vanilla taste.

Ridgeline Farms - Green Lantern - Haven in Santa Ana

Southern Humboldt County has had it pretty rough in the age of legal

cannabis with many small farmers having trouble meeting the permitting demands of the times. But through it all, the region is still the heart of the ancestral homeland of top-shelf marijuana, and they got the world title back this fall when Ridgeline Farms won The Emerald Cup, which is essentially the sungrown pot world championship. They had actually been growing the Green Lantern for years, and were still sitting on some, trying to move it, when it won the cup! Needless to say, demand quickly increased for the strain that pairs a fuel and fruit flavor.

Area 41 - Alien Labs - Connected

While there are a lot of options that would be a solid pick on the Connected menu, I constantly find myself looking back to the Area 41 as my favorite of the Gelato crosses that dropped last summer. It features Gelato #41, arguably

the nicest version of the strain ever not from original breeders Jigga and Mr. Sherbinski. Add in Alien Labs longtime hype machine Lemon Fuel OG, and you've obviously got something very special.

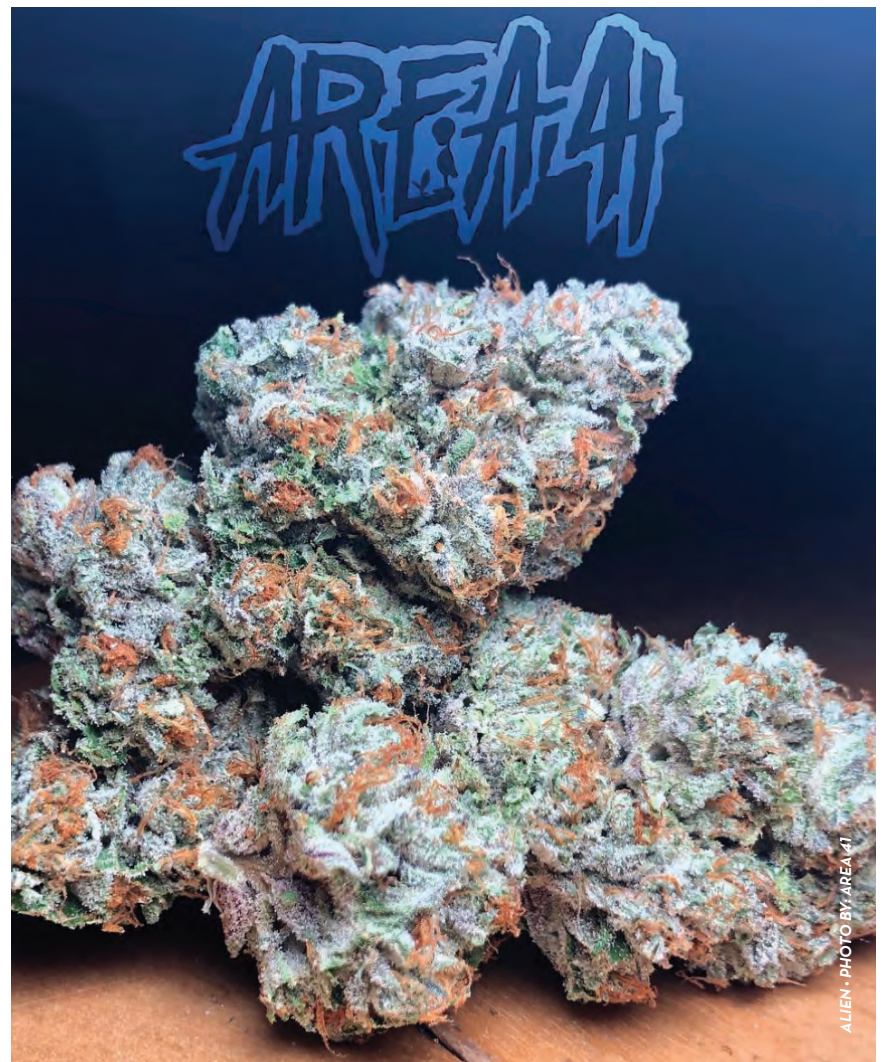
Strawberry Valley by Happy Day Farms - Regenerative Farm Award recipient - Haven

For the fans of responsible outdoor cannabis cultivation, look no further than The Emerald Cup's regenerative farming award winners at Happy Day Farms. One of three farms to take home the award in 2018, it is given to cannabis farmers who grow their cannabis as part of a wider symbiotic relationship with the land they look to nurture and protect from more destructive farming practices. Their Strawberry Valley is a blend of their Strawberry OG and a fantastic Chem x SFV Pheno. According to Happy Day Farms, it has

sweet overtones backed by deep gas underskunk. It's strong, but a great time.

From The Earth - Golden Strawberries 710

Originally bred by the team at DNA genetics, the primo cultivators over at 710 Labs propagated over 30 seeds on the hunt for their winner, and you can see the effort in the results. Much of the time when you hear 710 Labs' name, you're probably thinking there are some great concentrates on deck. Nevertheless, their flower game is also on point and has become more prevalent since the legal market opened with this cross of Strawberry Banana and Kosher Kush. You'll get a lot of the flavor that earned Strawberry Banana ton of awards, with a bit of extra kick provided by the Kosher Kush.

IRVINE WEEKLY'S SUGGESTED FILMS TO SEE BASED ON YOUR INTERESTS.

Next week, the Newport Beach Film Festival will kick off its 20th annual celebration of the arts and culture in big form. With last year's event bringing more than 50,000 people to Orange County from around the world, this year is sure to be monumental. Everything will kick off Thursday, April 25, with the festival's Opening Night Gala following its opening night film. The 3,000 person event, which will take place in the center of Fashion Island, boasts food prepared by 30 of the top Orange County restaurants, a DJ, a hosted bar by Tito's Vodka and Peroni, and a live performance by Side Deal, the Newport-formed band consisting of members of Train, Sugar Ray and PawnShop kings (plus some special, surprise guests).

The Newport Beach Film Festival is currently the largest film festival in Southern California, with over 120 narrative features and more than 200 short film screenings, plus its wide selection of parties and events. Because of its size and prestige, some locals might view the festival as just another pretentious, Hollywood-centric event that requires a ton of money or industry knowhow just to

get in the door. But the festival's creators want the citizens of Orange County to know that is not the case.

"This is for the entire community. This isn't for the film industry, it's for everyone, throughout Orange County and Southern California, to participate in," said Gregg Schwenk, the festival's founder and CEO. With tickets for some screenings as low as \$16, much of the festival is easily accessible to everyone in the surrounding area. Says Schwenk, "Even if you've never been to a film festival, this is the year to come."

Still, the vast scope of the festival can be enough to make the untrained festival-goer feel lost in a sea of choices. To help you decide where to spend your time, we've compiled a list of some of the top films to see based on your interests. Even if you can only make it to one film screening, being a part of this year's festival is something you will not forget.

THE HEADLINERS

The big ones. These films open and close the entire festival, which means they're ones you should not miss.

Opening Night – "Luce" Thursday, April 25, 7:00 p.m.

A former child soldier from Africa, adopted by white parents and naturalized in America, becomes a star athlete and top student in his suburban Virginia high school – only to find his close-knit family life and impeccable academic record challenged by a teacher after she discovers unsettling political views in a homework assignment.

Closing Night – "Part of Water" (World Premiere) *

Thursday, May 2, 8:00 p.m.

When most people think of ocean lifeguards, they think of Baywatch; but that couldn't be further from the truth. "Part of Water" tells the tragic story of fallen lifeguard Ben Carlson, who lost his life in the line of duty while on a rescue during a massive swell in 2014. Through Ben's story, "Part of Water" sheds light on the countless dangers that ocean lifeguards face and helps earn them the respect they've always deserved.

FOR THOSE LOOKING TO LAUGH (AND MAYBE CRY)

These films are some of the major comedies hitting the festival screens.
