





VEGETABLE BLISS AT BUTTERLEAF



rvine has few culinary establishments that are fully vegan – meaning no animal products are used in the food or beverages served. Although the city of Irvine is growing rapidly, the plant-based food craze is taking its time getting to the bustling city of opportunity. The few places Irvine does have, however, are outstanding and offer something for vegans and vegetarians in the area, as well as the omnivores who want to try their hat at reducing the meat and dairy in their lives. Luckily, just down the street from John Wayne Airport, vegans and non-vegans alike can find satisfying hearty grub at Butterleaf in the Trade Food Hall on Michelson Drive

Butterleaf is a gem of a casual counter café inside the Trade Food Hall, which is kind of like a chic contemporary food court for the area. Honestly, Butterleaf offers something for every-

body; whether you're in the mood for burritos, tostadas, burgers, salads, bowls, fries, soup or deep-fried treats, Butterleaf's got you covered. Owned by chef Andrew Gruel and Lauren Gruel, Butterleaf is their newest addition to their restaurant family, and comes from a place of true food love. They own Slapfish and Two Birds Chicken, both of which are neither vegan nor vegetarian, and Andrew Gruel is also a judge on the Food Network and a host for the AM radio show SoCal Restaurant Show. The fact that the owners are not vegans is a little disheartening to the plant-based community since it shows us that they are not in this business for the health and promotion of α plant-based diet, but their food does tell us that they sure love vegetables. In the last decade, veganism and veg-

In the last decade, veganism and vegetarianism have been gaining steam all over the world. There are many ways that going vegan can help the

planet, as we now know that animal agriculture is responsible for more greenhouse gas emissions than all transport combined. Raising animals for food requires massive amounts of land, food, energy and water – the byproducts of animal agriculture pollute our air and waterways. Compared to meat-eaters, vegans also weigh less, have lower cholesterol, blood pressure and rates of type 2 diabetes. They have a 30 percent lower risk of heart disease and lower cancer rates.

Southern California has become a Mecca for vegans and vegetarians, and with hundreds of different styles, types, price-points and tastes for plant-based cuisine, you've really got to make something top shelf in order to last in this competitive environment. Thankfully, Butterleaf is sticking around. Its perfect combination of veggie-heavy, nutrient-dense dishes are not only tasty choices for anybody, but

they are created in a way that leaves diners full and satisfied.

The food at Butterleaf is simple and satisfying, but something to note is that this is a restaurant that is definitely created with the non-vegan in mind. This isn't vegan food for vegan people, this is plant-based food for non-vegetarians looking to expand their diet to include more veggies and less meat. The dishes at Butterleaf don't offer much in the way of high protein options, but do offer complete protein sources in small quantities and do so in a way that can satisfy your hunger with added fiber, seasoning, healthy fats and oils.

This writer's personal favorite, the Avocado Bombs are the light, crispy and fluffy cousin to boring old avocado toast. These little bombs are whole pieces of avocado covered in a seasoned panko breading and served with a sweet and spicy sauce that makes them irresistible. This is not their



healthiest option, but is much healthier than some deep-fried something you-could find anywhere else.

Their tacos or tostadas (depending on the season) are simple yet decadent. The flavorful veggie-loaded tacos or tostadas are stuffed with sauce, avocado, perfectly cooked seasonal veggies, spices and herbs and have a perfect crunch to them. There is no need a side dish with these tostadas (or tacos), although they have amazing sweet potato fries, guacamole and chips, umami chips, veggie chowder and sometimes even have vegan poutine.


Now, the burger is a local favorite. With a decently-sized homemade hearty black bean and quinoa patty, a fluffy and tasty wheat bun, a perfect combination of ketchup and secret sauce, and the traditional butterleaf lettuce, tomato and smashed avocado, it seems pretty straightforward. But, this burger patty is one of the tastiest house patties we've had. People will order two of these at a time they're so good. The burrito, on the other hand. should not be order in pairs. This massive baby is a beast that is jam-packed with veggies, quinoa, avocado, sauce and seeds, but it so hearty we've yet to finish one in entirety.

The bowl and the salad are very simi-

lar, with minimal differences between the two. The salad offers more raw veggies and smaller chops, while the bowl has a pile of grilled and sautéed veggies with quinoa and smashed avocado, and garnished with a variety of seeds; both are topped with a delicious carrot vinaigrette or salsa.

The food court style of eatery is popping up all over SoCal, and although the ambience is lacking slightly, most people forget all about it once they start chowing down on the delicious food options at their disposal. Although it feels more like a lunch spot, Butterleaf stays open until 8 or 9 p.m. and is open seven days a week. It also offers natural sodas, kombuchas and waters. The Trade Food Hall is a very busy center, especially around lunch time, so parking is a big issue that this shopping center has not seemed to have worked out yet. But it's packed for a reason: The offerings inside this center and especially inside the Trade Food Hall are outstanding.

RICHARD DOYLE: BRINGING A NATURAL GIFT FOR STORYTELLING TO THE PAGEANT

THE VOICE AND CREATIVE GUIDE OF THE LAGUNA BEACH PAGEANT OF THE MASTERS DISCUSSES HIS JOURNEY AND THE INSPIRATION HE DRAWS FROM LEONARDO DA VINCI.

ichard Doyle, narrator, Laguna
Beach Pageant of the Masters,
South Coast Repertory Theater
founding actor, and longtime
Irvine resident, believes that live theater
is about creating performances that
enable viewers to reflect on themselves
and to enhance their understanding

of the world around us. "It is important for actors to let the audience in," he explains.

"Before we had language," the loquacious Doyle adds, "people acted things out. In the old days, people told stories, often about the hunt. In fact, storytelling is prevalent in our culture."

As an engaging storyteller and narrator, Doyle is enamored with the pageant's 2019 production of The Time Machine, with its globe-trotting journey around the world, and into the past, present and future, in search of great art. He is especially interested in the show's emphasis on artist/scientist/

inventor Leonardo da Vinci, who died exactly 500 years ago. Inspired by the polymath's pioneering creative and scientific efforts, and by his profound wisdom, Doyle says, "The genesis of all art came from Leonardo. He predicted many things, and his great gift was his imagination."

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

technology, perhaps preparing himself for this year's show. In the 2013 production, "The Big Picture," he explained how masterpieces of art have inspired and informed the movies. And for 2014's "The Art Detective," he described the unsolved mysteries that fill art history. The 2015 "Pursuit of Happiness" show was family-friendly, and 2016's "Partners" pageant, with its theatrical and scientific partnerships, was enhanced by live dance routines, which Doyle graciously introduced.

While preparing for the 2017 pageant production, "The Grand Tour," Doyle re-connected with his childhood years living in Italy. That show, he explains, was based on letters from children, and explored how they experienced great art. It was a device to take the audience through the art of Europe. "I also learned a lot about the art I saw as a child," he says. The 2018 pageant, "Under the Sun," with its emphasis on European and California impressionism, provided another learning experience for both the narrator and the audience.

Doyle explains that he narrates to 2,700 people, seven evenings a week over eight weeks. And as the pageant is live theater, each night is special. Before intermission during a 2012 production of

Talking about his own childhood, Doyle recalls growing up with a mother who encouraged his appreciation of the arts. He was also fortunate to live in Italy from ages 8 to 13, to have the opportunity to see great art, to live among the scintillating colors of the ocean and the sky, and to learn foreign languages there – a skill that he regards as good preparation for acting. He adds that, as he was telling stories from an early age, he was destined to become a pageant narrator.

Discussing the long arc of his career, Doyle recalls meeting David Emmes, South Coast Repertory founding director, at Long Beach City College in 1964. "I joined SCR that year, worked with the theater for a few more years, and then was drafted into the army and went to Vietnam. In 1969, I returned home, attended Long Beach City College and then transferred to the Cal State Long Beach Theater Arts Department. I also rejoined South Coast Repertory, as Emmes told me that Orange County was growing and needed the arts."


Doyle has performed in more than 200 productions at SCR. He has played the Ghost of Christmas Past in A Christmas Carol many times, and performed in

Shakespeare's Midsummer Night's Dream, Oscar Wilde's The Importance of Being Earnest, Stephen Schwartz and John-Michael Tebelak's Godspell, and Cole Porter's Anything Goes. He has had parts in the TV shows Cheers and Mash TV shows, and done voice-overs for Hanna-Barbera cartoons – often playing the bad guy – and for a variety of video games.

He began narrating the Pageant of the Masters (also referred to as tableaux vivants or living pictures) in 2011, with the theme of, "Only Make Believe." "While preparing for that year's production," he recalls, "the managers walked me through the backstage, introduced me to the script writer, Dan Dulling, and even asked me to help write the script." Beginning with that year's show, pageant managers have sent Doyle their demos, written text and story ideas, and encouraged him to help determine the trajectory of the story. "Narration here is a collaborative effort," he says, adding that the pageant composer listens to him read the story lines and then puts music to the narration.

For the 2012 pageant, "The Genius," he related to the audience stories about the relationship between art, science and





"The Genius," as the special effects had NASA's rover "Curiosity" land on Mars, the audience cheered for several minutes. Doyle patiently waited for the spectators to quiet down, then encouraged them to enjoy the intermission. "Quality communication is still possible between human beings, without electronics," he says. "You can sit as a group together and experience a live performance, an exchange of ideas."

One of Doyle's most enlightening experiences at the pageant occurred in 2016. Shortly after that show ended, a woman from the audience walked into the narrator's booth at the back of the outdoor theater and asked, "Are you the narrator?" When he replied that he was, she thanked him, saying, "I felt like you were talking to me."

"That was the moment when the light came on," he recalls. "Creating the character of the narrator, the spirit guide if you will, of the evening, is the challenge for me, so that the character can tell the general story of the evening, delve into these various little dramatic episodes, and underscore what's going on onstage."

As pageant narrator, Richard Doyle continues a tradition dating back to 1933. During that summer, artists put on costumes and strode through Laguna Beach to the Festival of Arts grounds. There they posed behind oversized frames, re-creating well-known works of art. Impresarios Roy and Marie Ropp refined that display two years later and



officially renamed the production the Pageant of the Masters.

Today, the pageant, which plays to more than 200,000 visitors each summer in the Irvine Bowl, transforms volunteer models and props into oversized recreations of works of art, from ancient to modern to contemporary, accompanied by original music played by a live orchestra.





J Cruz (on-air from 2 p.m. to 7 p.m.) who holds down the afternoon slot states. "Real Street Fest was created for our listener family, to experience two days with them as all of their favorite hip-hop artists hit those three stages together. It's history in the making for radio, festivals and hip-hop culture. There are over 30

IRVINE COUNCIL APPROVES VETERANS CEMETERY LOCATION

AFTER A CONTENTIOUS MEETING, THE COUNCIL VOTED 4-1 TO BUILD THE CEMETERY ON CITY LAND AT THE ORANGE COUNTY GREAT PARK.

ensions rose at the July 24
Irvine City Council meeting
as councilmembers considered the future location for the
development of the Southern California
Veterans Memorial Park and Cemetery.
In the packed City Hall, councilmembers voted to build the veterans cemetery on city land originally planned for a golf course in a 4-1 vote. Mayor Christina Shea, Mayor Pro Tempore Anthony
Kuo and councilmembers Michael Carroll and Farrah Khan were in support.
Melissa Fox was the sole "No" vote.

"I am so proud that our council approved a final resting place for our Orange County veterans," Mayor Shea told Irvine Weekly. "Now we need the state Senate to do the right thing and approve the full funding package so we can finally honor our veterans in the

way they deserve."

The meeting was rife with emotion, opinion and, at times, conjecture. Public comments were offered for over three hours by residents, veterans, political operatives, school board members and a state senator from neighboring Santa Ana.

Mayor Shea, who has spearheaded efforts to build a veterans cemetery and memorial, presided over the meeting and the at-times rambunctious crowd. At one point during the meeting state Sen. Tom Umberg (D-Santa Ana) – whose district doesn't include Irvine – refused to give up the microphone after his allotted three-minute speaking time expired. He then turned around and bizarrely began addressing the audience directly. (To make sure everyone who attends a public meeting has an

opportunity to speak, many cities set time limits for public comments.)

Umberg has ties to Larry Agran, the former Irvine councilmember who was ousted from the City Council in 2014 after a failed re-election bid clouded by extensive controversy around his handling of the Great Park. Agran has been accused of using the veterans cemetery and veterans for political gain.

Ultimately, despite the political posturing and rancor, Irvine's decision on the veterans cemetery location came down to the 4-l council vote.

"We are making good on a promise to deliver the Southern California Veterans Memorial Park and Cemetery with a bi-partisan plan that respects our veterans and taxpayers," said Mayor Pro Tem Kuo. "As our patient veterans organizations have been saying, we are finally on the path to 'get this done!"

Nick Berardino, president of the Veterans Alliance of Orange County, told
Irvine Weekly, "Veterans who have so bravely served this great nation were served by a City Council majority who voted for the only reasonable proposal."

The golf course site the council approved Tuesday has already completed and passed environmental review and is estimated to save the city upwards of \$30 million to construct compared to alternative sites.

On July 26, Mayor Shea sent a letter to state Assemblymember Sharon Quirk-Silva, notifying her of the council's decision and providing the full text of the resolution. The resolution authorizes the Irvine city manager and city attorney to negotiate a "transfer agreement" with the state.
